Leadership



Leadership – The ability to lead or direct others on a course or in a direction.

Leader – A person who influences the actions of others.

Leadership

- Many people are leaders because they inspire others to perform well.
- A company tries to develop many leaders since teamwork is important.
- Shared leadership means different people lead depending on the expertise needed.
- The success of schools, businesses, cities, and nations depends on good leaders.

Leadership Traits

Leaders are individuals who

- respect the rights and dignity of others.
- are straightforward.
- are well informed on matters that concern the group.
- are positive and excited about the group's work.
- inspire accomplishments.

Effective Leadership at School and at Work

- Effective leaders share the same skills and traits.
- Whether at school or work, good leaders
 - arrive early for meetings.
 - leave a good impression.
 - develop good conversational skills.
 - remember the names of everyone.

 SkillsUSA offers training and employment opportunities for students preparing to enter the workforce.


Technology Student Association

How Student Groups Operate

- Student groups operate similarly by
 - having officers
 - having one or more committees
 - holding meetings on a regular basis that are planned days in advance through the issuing of agendas
- Agenda An order of business listing activities that will occur during a meeting.

How Student Groups Operate

- The agenda helps members intelligently discuss the business of the group.
- Good meetings
 - follow the agenda.
 - start and end on time.
 - are held in a room with good lighting and comfortable seating.
 - are conducted according to parliamentary procedure.

Parliamentary Procedure

- Parliamentary procedure An orderly way of conducting a meeting and discussing group business.
- Robert's Rules of Order The most common reference book describing the parliamentary procedures used at business meetings.
