

Chapter 17 Supplemental Activity

Create a Web Page

Complete Lesson 105 before you complete this activity.

In this activity, you will create a Web page related to a camping trip for students.

1. Access the Internet. Use a search engine to find sites with information about camping safety. Make a note of the Web site address for the site you think is most appropriate for students.
2. Start *Notepad*. Using information from your textbook as needed, enter text and HTML tags to create a new Web page as directed below.
3. For the Web page title, key **Class Camping Trip**. Enter a horizontal rule below the main title.
4. Below the horizontal rule, key **Items to Pack** and make the text bold. Leave one blank line and begin a bulleted list. Enter five more items you think are appropriate to pack for a camping trip, such as a sleeping bag, hiking boots, a jacket, or a swimsuit.
5. Below the bulleted list, key the text **Click here for camping safety information**. Make this text a link to the Web site you found that has camping safety information.
6. Save the file in a new folder named *camping*. For the filename, use *camping1.html*. Close *Notepad*. View the Web page in a browser. If you find errors or want to change the formatting, open the file in Notepad and make corrections.

Chapter 17 Supplemental Activity

Create and Link Web Pages

Complete Lesson 105 before you complete this activity.

1. Open the *camping1.html* Web page that you created in the previous supplemental activity. Add an appropriate image to the Web page. Use clip art or photos available on your computer or that you find on the Internet. Save the file using the same name.
2. Create a new Web page related to the camping trip. For the Web page title, key **Class Camping Trip**. Enter a horizontal rule below the main title.
3. Below the horizontal rule, key **Activities** and make the text bold. Leave one blank line and begin a bulleted list. Enter five or more activities that you think students might want to do on a camping trip. For example, the group might go swimming, canoeing, or hiking.
4. Add an appropriate image to the Web page. Use clip art available on your computer or that you find on the Internet. Save the file in the *camping* folder. Enter *camping2.html* for the filename.
5. Create another Web page related to the camping trip. For the Web page title, key **Class Camping Trip**. Enter a horizontal rule below the main title.
6. Below the horizontal rule, key **Dates and Location** and make the text bold. Leave one blank line. Enter **Dates:** and then two or three days for when the camping trip will take place. For example, **Dates: May 20 and 21**.
7. Leave a blank line. Enter **Location:** and the name of a park or campground in your area where the class could go camping. Leave a blank line and key a short paragraph that describes the park or campground.
8. Add an appropriate image to the Web page. Use clip art or photos available on your computer or that you find on the Internet. Save the file in the *camping* folder. Enter *camping3.html* for the filename.
9. On each of the Web pages, create links to the other two pages. Choose appropriate text or images to use for the links. Remember to save each page after adding the links.
10. View the Web pages in a browser. If you find errors or want to change the formatting, open the files and make corrections.
